## 11TH STEP EXPERIENCE

Step II: "Sought through prayer and meditation to improve our conscious contact with God as we understood Him, praying only for knowledge of His will for us and the power to carry that out."

Improving my conscious contact with god, as I understand them, is an ongoing venture. I am grateful for the journey of openness, willingness, and growth that step II presents. As the I2xI2 states prayer and meditation are our principal means of conscious contact with god. Upon Awakening, my Nightly Review and end of day meditation and prayer to relieve me of the defects that no longer useful to helping others, gratitude lists with women in the program, practicing the pause, and attempting to grow my moments of conscious presences are all improving my contact with God as I understand him.

When I do this life is more manageable, I am able to stay in acceptance (or at least get there quicker) and I'm not wasting energy fighting against all things. But this is not how I started. I had lost my faith and connection with my higher power when I walked in to these rooms and thought prayer and meditation was for others and a waste of time. I had women who came along side me and asked me to be open and willing, to read about spiritual awakenings in the back of the book, and to just give it a try. "Of course, we did experiment, when unexpected results followed, we felt different; in fact, we knew different; and so, we were sold on the practice of prayer and meditation" (AA 12x12).

When I get out of my own way and do the things that I know work, from witnessing the miracles around me and within me, I am able to have a new reaction to life. My ego and privilege are checked and I become right sized. Staying connected to my higher power, practicing through prayer and meditation, my connection grows deeper and I don't have to be lost, frightened or purposeless. I wish I could say that this happens all the time or that I hop out of bed to do morning meditation each day but that is not the how it is for me; I am still a work in progress but striving towards a more perfect practice. ~Amie B., Cedar Rapids, IA




A Tool for Reading Alcoholics Anonymous
